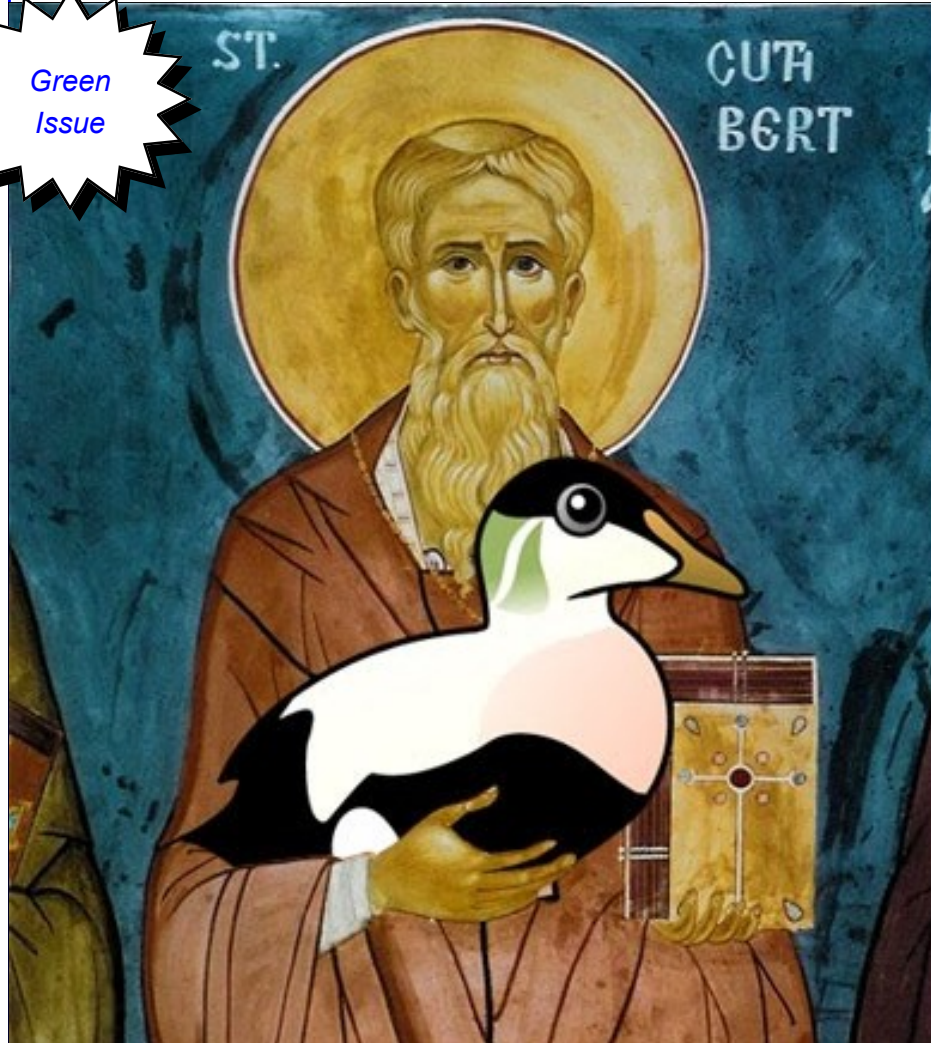

Many Churches are doing 'green' things, from installing LED lights to building a community hall out of straw bales. At St John's volunteers collect bottle tops for recycling, and women's bras for reuse. We are also cutting down use of energy-hungry kettles, turning to the urn and the teapot instead.



If we start with Genesis and God creating everything, the onus is on us to try not to destroy it. Mankind's dominion over animals brings with it responsibility and stewardship. Plants and animals are essential for sustaining ecosystems that give us food, fuel, health and wealth. Responding positively to climate change is essential if we are to safeguard God's creation. The Church of England has a campaign to enable the whole church to address - in faith, practice and mission - this issue. Justin Welby, Archbishop of Canterbury said; "Reducing the causes of climate change is essential to the life of faith. It is a way to love our neighbour and to steward the gift of creation." I'm not sure St. Francis of Assisi, patron saint of animals and environment could have put it any better! He may be viewed as the original Earth Day advocate.

Our own churchyards are an important part of the diverse natural habitat of England, where we can help care for and protect the environment literally on our doorstep.

My family has for many years practised Veganism, because we believe that a plant-based diet has a positive effect on the environment, using less valuable resources of land and water while producing more sustainable food. This is not new. During the first 1,000 years of the Christian Church there were many saints who loved animals. They lived with them, rescued them, nursed them and saved them from hunters. Of course I must mention St. Cuthbert (634—687 AD) who protected the birds around his hermitage on the Farne Islands particularly Eider ducks, which are still known locally as Cuddy Ducks. Coincidentally his Saint's Day is March 20th each year. Bringing us right up to date, the Diocese of Salisbury has become the Church of England's first Eco Diocese. Hertfordshire County Council has declared a climate emergency and is focussing on transport emissions, water use and tree planting to help our environment.

World Environment Day, on June 5th, is the UN's most important day for encouraging worldwide awareness and action for the protection of our environment. The Church of England has a Christian presence in every community across England and representatives world-wide. It is committed to making a positive impact on the environment. We finished the evening with pizzas in the annexe. Look out for Christingle next year – it'll be the second Sunday of January – we'd love to see you there.

What's on this term?

Sunday Club continues to meet each Sunday during term time during the morning service for Bible stories, games, crafts, music and prayer. Everyone is welcome to join us and explore God's goodness and love, from toddlers to Year 6. In **Sunday Club this February and March** we will be reading the stories of Jesus from Matthew's gospel.

We have family services on **2nd February and 22nd March** this year. In February, we will hear the story of Simeon and Anna, who meet the infant Jesus in the temple and praise God for keeping his promise of salvation. In the church, the festival is known as **Candlemas**. Then in March, we move our family service to the third Sunday, 22nd, and celebrate **Mothering Sunday** together with activities for the children, music and flower distribution. Oh and do look out too for pancakes at the end of February, to mark the beginning of Lent.

In the last issue we gave a tribute to Jack who died in October. By mistake we said he and Eveline married in 1951, when in fact it was in 1949. . Eveline has lived in the Garden City since she was a small child, her father having come to work for Welwyn Builders. He soon bought a house under construction in Great North Road. Eveline attended Parkway School then won a Scholarship to Hitchin Grammar School. She went to Sunday School at St John's.



Jack left Mevagissey in 1942 to train as a mechanical engineer in Bristol. In 1947 he moved to Hatfield and took up a position at De Havilland on the design of aircraft propellers. He rented a room in Green Lanes and started to look for a church, and soon found St John's which he liked. It was a good choice as it led to him meeting Eveline.

Their first encounter was in 1947 at a dance advertised by the church, held in the Village Hall, on what is now the Archery field. A couple of weeks later, by chance, they both went to another dance, this time in the Parkway Restaurant (now part of John Lewis). They started meeting regularly at the Sunday Evening Services as Jack spent every weekday evening studying.

After their marriage they initially lived with Eveline's parents but by luck an opportunity came up to buy the bungalow in New Road where they have lived ever since. Their bedroom looks over fields with the tower of St John's proud on its hill in the distance – a great view. Jack's career prospered because he was extremely talented, and he became Head of the Engineering Design Department at Lincoln Electric in Broadwater Road. In 1969 he had a change of career in when he became a Senior Lecturer in Mechanical and Aeronautical Engineering at The Hatfield Polytechnic where he was keen to share his wealth of experience with his students. Whilst there he spent six years working in the evenings and weekends on a thesis for a PhD which he was awarded in 1978. He remained at Hatfield Poly until retirement.

Jack and Eveline worked tirelessly for St John's, which he once said "is my life". Many of the improvements to the Church were the result of his labours. Eveline still has the framed certificate given to Jack by Christopher, Bishop of St Albans, in September 2000 to mark 50 years' service on the PCC, including four years as Church warden – an achievement that will be hard to beat.

Many congratulations to Barry, who lives by Lemsford Springs and has been named Hertfordshire's Outstanding Naturalist 2019, by the Herts Natural History society. Even St Cuthbert would have been impressed by his work for birds!

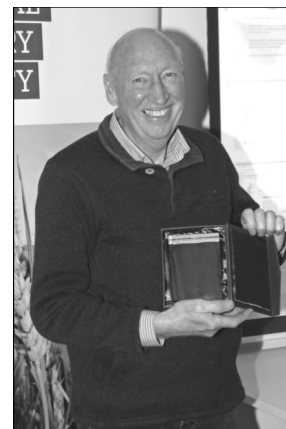
Barry has worked voluntarily at the Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust's Lemsford Springs reserve since 1977 and has been its honorary Warden since 1981. During those 40 years he has organised and supervised more than 500 work-parties and community events there and collaborated in a scientifically valuable project on the Green Sandpipers *Tringa ochropus* that migrate to the reserve each winter. As past Award-winner Peter Oakenfull observed when making the presentation "For most people who know the reserve, he *is* Lemsford Springs".

His colour-ringing of Green Sandpipers at Lemsford Springs, with others, started in 1983 and is now the longest running project of its kind on waders in Europe. More than 200 individuals have been ringed and three scientific papers (on site fidelity, feeding behaviour and requirements, and the use of geolocator harnesses) have been published

However, Barry's ringing activities have not been limited to one species. He was the first to ring Little Egret *Egretta garzetta* in 2003 as it reached Hertfordshire as a breeding species, and likewise Red Kite *Milvus milvus*. He remains actively involved in the colour-ringing of Little Egrets at Verulamium Lake, St Albans and Stanborough Lake, Welwyn Garden city, where 71 pulli and full-grown birds have been ringed to date. He has been responsible for heronry census surveys at three sites since 1987.

More widely, he has assisted with ringing projects around the British coastline, across Europe and in South Africa and Tanzania. He is also an enthusiastic trainer of new 'ringers', while assessing more expert ones for permit advancement.

In professional life, Barry was Welwyn Hatfield District's Environmental Strategy Officer from 1990 to 2000. He initiated local conservation and public engagement projects while developing the council's environmental policies, including publication of the first nature conservation strategy for a Herts local authority. He is also a past Chairman of the Herts Bird Club (1986-7) and former writer of the 'waders' section for the Herts Bird Report. Well done indeed!!



At Friendship Teas in January, Evelyn Beswarick told us about the high wall surrounding the churchyard. “Many years ago - well over 70—it was unstable and had to be repaired. Several Saturday mornings were spent by the congregation knocking the mortar off the bricks in order to use them again. The wall was rebuilt but at a reduced height.” Thankfully, it still seems pretty secure.



I start with this anecdote because before Christmas three Sycamore trees were removed by contractors from the boundary wall adjacent to Lemsford House. The ivy covering them was masking damage which was deemed to be a danger if the trees were caught in a strong wind. The stumps have been ground out and the bank will be tidied and planted in this next year. *See pictures inside front cover*

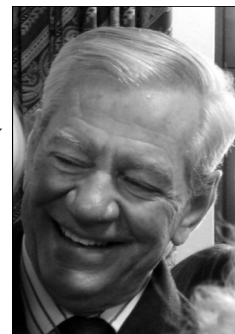
Volunteers have made a big difference already to the Church gardens – it’s year 2 now of the 5 year plan! It’s not all hard gardening, some jobs are light and we need records kept and coffees made on our working party days. The Gardeners meet on the **3rd Thursday each month** (9.30-12.00) and once a quarter on Saturday mornings. The next day for “**Inside and Out**” work is **March 21st** 9– noon. This includes church cleaning and gardening – do bring relevant gloves.

There are costs involved in caring for the gardens and if you feel you would like to help we would really appreciate a contribution. Removing the trees cost nearly £1000; we have other challenging trees to keep an eye on; the paths surrounding the church are unstable in places and need to be re-bedded; our garden tools are old and need to be replaced... I could go on. We have had plants and bulbs and ‘beebombs’ donated to brighten us up throughout the year and lots of good ideas for getting to a point of generally lower maintenance. **Do contact me if you have ideas or plants too.**

Plastic flowers and vases are not encouraged in Church graveyards and we will be removing various items at the end of January. Please make contact if this is something you feel needs to be discussed.

On the second Wednesday of each month, we hold a short service for the residents of Stanborough Lodge. Usually about 12 of the 23 residents come along. I only became aware of this service during Edward's time of ministry and used to accompany him to give him some support. Fortunately now, Mary and Jenny are also able to join in. The main part of the service is to sing hymns and carols. There is a reading from one of the Gideon Bibles in the home (and in other care homes); a short talk; and a time of prayer together.



To supplement (or lead !) our singing we select from about 60 hymns on three CDs and a hymn book with large print. It's a joy to see many residents singing away happily as they remember the words of well-known hymns from their youth.

At Christmas time, children in the St. John's School Choir come along to sing in a carol service which is always a highlight for the residents.

We are always grateful to the Manager, Beauty Maruta, and her staff for welcoming us and helping us to hold these services.

After the death of Henry Frederick Cowper in 1887 the Hall, whilst in the ownership of the 7th Earl Cowper, was rented out and between 1893 and 1921 the house was rented to Lord Mount-Stephen. This will enable people to pay tribute to those who served in one of the most significant events in our country's history.

The group has started to research **WW2** to mark this special day. To help jog your memory I have found a few images from the archive (*inside back cover*). The first image is of **the choir in 1947**, two years after VE day. All would have experienced the war in Lemsford Parish. Are you in this image or do you know someone in the photo? The next image is a sweet little boy standing in a dirt track in Lemsford Village High Street who transformed into a Brylcreem boy during the war; his name was **Bernard Smith**. The final image is Arthur Ronald Nall-Cain with son and heir, Ronald Charles Manus Nall-Cain (Lord Charles' Father). Arthur used **Brocket Hall** to entertain supporters of Germany including Hermann Wilhelm Göring and he attended Hitler's 50th birthday celebration in 1939 (not sure what present he got him, what do you buy someone with world domination on his bucket list? Maybe a map of the world and a chunky marker pen...) and was a close friend of Joachim von Ribbentrop. According to Neville Chamberlain, Foreign Secretary, the Earl of Halifax used Brocket as a conduit to convey the views of the British government to the leading German Nazis.
