Rev Ron Ingamells

Many congratulations to Ron who recently celebrated his 90th birthday.

He was Vicar of St. John's from 1979 – 2002 when he was also working for the YMCA National Council as the Christian Education and Training Officer.

Ron was also Chair of the School Governors 'I really enjoyed my link with the school both formally and getting to know many of the pupils".

The Lemsford Fete organised by the church had a long history and was well supported; after Ron proposed that it should be a joint event with the school it became one of the largest events in the area, especially considering the size of the village.

In his term there were significant developments including a new organ, the Annexe, floodlighting, and a redesigned Garden of Remembrance.

YMCA work took him all over the UK and many European countries. His final project was on behalf of the European YMCA when he had 24 visits to Romania in order to restart the YMCAs after the revolution and many years of Communism. The other special international link was with Israel/Palestine, visiting in a number of capacities including leading two groups from the parish. Ron has a special link and sympathy for the Palestinian people in the



Occupied Territories and Gaza.

Ron played hockey for Gorleston H.C. and organised the Bishop's Hockey team (a team mainly of clergy!) and played tennis at Dellcott Tennis Club. He is still an honorary member of Brocket Hall Golf Club.

Ron's wife Janet sang with the BBC Chorus and was a piano teacher. In 2002 they moved to Buckden in Cambridgeshire. Janet died in 2014.

Ron returned to his beloved Norfolk and then married Ann Polley. They are both season-ticket holders at Norwich City 'Some friends say we must be loyal good supporters to stay with them for so long'! Ron is still active in the ministry taking services both in the local villages and at the city centre church St. Peter Mancroft.

He wrote recently: 'Thank you to Geoffrey Hollis for all his work as Editor of one of the best parish magazines that I read. and I see many. I am pleased to know that he has a successor!'

June Copping 4 June 1942— 30 September 2022

Rev Sue Stilwell conducted June's funeral at St John's on 30th September. Below are extracts from family recollections of her very full life.

une had 2 brothers, Nigel and **J** Geoffrey, and 2 sisters, Muriel and Daphne. She was baptised at St Cuthbert's Church Rye Park, where her mother was an organist. She attended primary schools in Hoddesdon and Rye Park, then St Joseph's Convent School near Hertford and Ware Secondary School until she was 16. June studied music at school, and joined St Margaret's Church Choir at age 10. She later taught in the Sunday school there and celebrated Christmas Day there until recently. June also joined choral societies in Ware and Hoddesdon. June once said that her foundation was her family; she never married, and enjoyed her independence and freedom to follow her own path.

At school, June liked maths; her first job was in Barclays Bank in Fenchurch St London. She transferred to the Cheshunt branch and then to Ware. Eventually she left to join Symonds Engineering in Cheshunt. Her career took a new direction when she started working for the Polytechnic of North London in Holloway Rd (now the Metropolitan University) in its Library where she stayed for 21 years.

June took up sketching and art, going on several Art holidays. She taught art at Oakland's college before she went freelance and taught at the WI. Until recently June was teaching calligraphy, craft and art at local care



homes and in her own home. June joined the Friendship Force and the National Trust enjoying trips all over England and abroad including Japan, India, Brazil, New Zealand, Holland, Israel and South Africa. She did a scuba diving course, for a visit to Australia! June loved gardening, like her brother Nigel, who owned a flower Nursery which their father started in St Margaret's called Sanville Gardens. S She also loved cats; her own lovely cat was called Sam. June attended church throughout her

life. In 2003 she joined St John's where she enjoyed lovely friendships, which were an important part of her life.

Editor: June was an active member at St John's, particularly in photographing our activities. She must have taken hundreds of pictures here, many of which I was pleased to include in this magazine. She constructed Year Books for us too, and these are now being cared for in our archives. She will be very much missed.

Farewell to the Queen

Having been taken by an aunt with some cousins to the Coronation in 1953 I really wanted to go full circle to see her lying in state. Trying to work out the best time to go was tricky as queue times were getting longer. So on the Thursday after a Pilates class and quick lunch I set off for Bermondsey via Kings Cross. The brisk walk from tube to riverbank was the only one I was to have, thereafter it was to be long stops and a dawdle very hard on the back and hips. Any stone steps were temporary seats or even perching on a wall. We worked out we should be at Westminster Hall about midnight after nine hours of queuing and this was correct. We were all expecting our wristbands straight away, but had to wait until Tower Bridge; my number was 093557 for that day; periodically we had to lift arms up to show our bands to police or marshals.

I buddied up initially in a group of ten which became twelve; in front were two ladies from Bridgend in Wales, two identical twins from Oxford, a couple from Brighton; behind me were three Italians also from Brighton, then later as some dropped back a lady from Sudbury and a gentleman from Horsham. Approaching Tower Bridge three ladies, one with a pushchair, tried to push in. This caused absolute furore especially as



one of the ladies said she would let me get my wrist band before her! The Italians got a marshal and the ladies went to the back of the queue. I have not heard of any other incidents like this - it had the effect of glueing us together even more. We were lucky it was a warm evening and wonderful to see all the sights of London from across the river—The Tower of London, the Cutty Sark, the Globe theatre, HMS Belfast, the Wheel, St Paul's and the tall city buildings. We started feeling tired and hungry around the London Aquarium but a group photograph raised morale (see next page). It was sheer bliss to climb some steps to cross Westminster bridge using different leg muscles as we came to a stop opposite the Houses of Parliament. Behind us all along the wall were painted red hearts one for each COVID victim - it was very moving especially for the twins who had lost their father to COVID.

Farewell to the Queen concluded

t last we reached the "snake" in front of Westminster Hall. The surface was very hard to walk on as to protect the grass a heavy duty bobbled protection had been laid suitable for heavy vehicles. We were suddenly joined by lots of men in dark suits some with medals who had special passes to join us at that point - they were noticeable as the queue was mainly women. The snake took over an hour and a half during which time hand sanitiser and any bottles were disposed of, phones were switched off and we were warned we were being filmed. Then airport security, which broke up our group. Before climbing stone stairs in to the Hall where you looked down on the dais, with the massive Hammer roof above, you were struck by the history of the

occasion - it seemed medieval and was so silent. Then very carefully down steep carpeted steps to reach the dais that was so high with the coffin on top under the Royal Standard together with the orb, sceptre and Imperial crown - with the guardsmen silently standing it became very emotional. The coffin seemed so small on top of the huge dais and you were reminded of how small the Oueen was: most of us were in tears and we were not hurried. I was so grateful to be able to say thank you for all her service to us and how fortunate we have been to have had her reigning over us. So one last look back through the tears and out into the night for the journey home, so pleased I had made the effort to go. I had gone full circle.

he group met at the Long Arm **L** and Short Arm in early November. We briefly discussed plans; the consensus was that we should carry on with our present format. Our meetings will be mostly social lunches and we will carry on with our websites. We will concentrate on providing local history information to St John's School and Church, make our archives available to the general public, and answer any enquires about the Parish's past. The final part of the celebrations of ▲ 150 years of St John's School took place on November 11th. Michelle Boylan, head teacher, invited the Group to talk to two classes about **Remembrance Day**. I was joined by group member Marion: we started by talking about why we have a remembrance service, who it is for and why it is held on the eleventh day of the eleventh month. The children knew all the answers and had a good understanding of the day. I found out later that the Head and staff had dedicated the previous day's assembly to this special day.

We played a YouTube video of local boy Donovan singing 'Universal Soldier' to help visualise the men and women who we remember on this day. We felt it was definitely worth playing as it is not only a great song but describes the men and woman who have died in conflicts and the waste of those lives due to the powers that be. As the lyrics state 'He really is to blame, his orders come from far away no more they come from here and there and you and me and brothers, can't you see? This is not the way we put the end to war'.

V e then made the topic personal by explaining that many of the twenty men who died in WW1 and whose names appear on the Lemsford Memorial went to St John's School. They played in the same playground as the present students and were taught, ate and played in the old school where today pupils have lunch. Out of the twenty men who died, we looked at Herbert Edward Freeman of A Company the 7th Battalion of the Bedfordshire Regiment who died, aged 19 on the 1st July 1916; the first day of the Battle of the Somme. His name is recorded on Pier and Face 2C. Thiepval Memorial, Somme, France. Herbert Attended St John's School from November 25th. 1902 – December 21st, 1910.

To show the school when he was there, and to give a glimpse of the students' lives at that time, we had an image of the boys of St John's with Mr Ladbury in 1910 in his garden on the path from the school to the church, passing the 2022 school fish pond. There is a very good chance that Herbert is in this picture, *seen inside the back cover*. It includes his friend Frederick William Spriggs who attended St John's School from June 4th, 1901, to March 31st, 1911.

Know the past to understand the future

The Bishops Hatfield Parish Magazine, Lemsford News for September 1916 contains a copy of the letter Mr & Mrs Freeman received from Herbert's captain. It reads: -'Dear Mrs Freeman. I have received your letter of the 20th inst., and regret I can only confirm the news of your son's death, as reported by the War Office.

He was killed by a bullet in the attack on the German Trenches on the 1st July, death being instantaneous. He was buried with a number of his comrades on the battlefield, about half a mile north-west of Carnoy., which is a little village about four miles east of Albert, his name being written on the cross over his grave. All his private possessions have been forwarded to the base, and should reach you in due course. Your son, Private Freeman, was one of the most useful members of my Company, and has, on several occasions, done most excellent patrol work during the winter. It may be some consolation to you that he died most gloriously in the foremost of the attack, which commenced on the 1st, and which our Battalion had the honour to lead. Please accept the sincerest sympathy of the Officers of his Company and myself in your sad loss. Yours truly, A.E. Percival, Capt.' Marion read out this poignant letter to the children.

To mark the sacrifice of the men of Lemsford and understand the true meaning of Remembrance Day, Marion read out an extract from the group's WW1 book 'Lest We Forget'.

'If we take a moment to reflect how devastating this was to the parish. All losses were wretched but the four lads. Christopher Wren, Herbert Freeman, Gordon Panter, Fredrick Spriggs, were all killed in a period of eleven day during the Battle of the Somme. Two on the first day; how must the other two felt going into battle day after day until they suffered the same fate. One twenty year old and three nineteen year old lads who would have spent evenings in The Sun Inn and The Long and Short together after a hard days work, four lads walking out with their sweethearts, Four lads playing for Lemsford F.C. wide eyed, and occasionally legless doing the things all young lads growing up would have done, with their lives in front of them, their future dreams were cruelly taken away from them. The broken-hearted mothers on the home front who would never hold their sons again".



O ur talk was followed by the students holding the two minutes silence around Lemsford War Memorial in the Church Grounds.

Christmas Parcels for the Boys at the Front As announced last month, the subscriptions for the school prizes would this year be devoted to parcels for our old boys, the present scholars took up the cause with great zest. On Thursday, 9th December, 27 boxes and the necessary contents were taken into school, and the children were very busy packing the individual contents into the several boxes. These consisted of sweets, chocolates, tobacco, cigarettes, cocoa, soap, candles, apples, oranges, cakes, magazines or papers, and a sprig of holly. Then the boxes were tied and afterwards sewn up in canvas. On Tuesday, December 21st, our first reply came. To show how the boys appreciated the contents I have quoted an extract from one of the letters received. "... Just a few lines to thank you and the children for the splendid parcel received on December 15th, in excellent condition. Some of the contents are luxuries and some are just what we want for we cannot get anything here just behind the trenches, where we are now resting before going up again. It seems nice to think we are not forgotten and anything from home is always appreciated." *Our thanks are due to the following*

Nature Notes

O pening the lid of a compost bin one day in August I was startled to see masses of earth worms trying to make an escape up the inside walls. I had no idea there were so many in the bin. And what had sparked this exodus?? The day followed heavy rains and apparently worms can drown in wet soil. Perhaps



they were trying to find dry land? Later I read that worms die in acidic conditions; possibly my food waste had unknowingly been noxious to them.

A few days later I played golf after another night of very heavy rains. The fairways were littered with thousands of worms—a veritable Wormageddon. Had they too been washed out, or had some nitrogen fertiliser been applied recently (unlikely, as the green keepers are experts)?

Earthworms are amazing creatures. They breathe through their skin. Their bodies are permeable: fluids and air can be absorbed directly. Earthworms need to stay moist for this process to work, so they avoid sunlight and arid climates. They also lack eyes, instead using receptors in their skin to sense light and touch. Earthworms have five "hearts" that pump blood through their bodies. They get their nutrition from bacteria and fungi that grow on dead and decomposing organic matter. Earthworms are hermaphrodites, meaning an individual worm has both male and female reproductive organs.

Worms in general do not get a good press in the Bible. The many references to them all refer to suffering, death and destruction. Job (7;5) moans "My flesh is clothed with worms and dirt". Psalm 22;6 :"But I am a worm and not a man, A reproach of men and despised by the people." Acts 12:23 "And immediately an angel of the Lord struck him because he did not give God the glory, and he was eaten by worms and died."

Even today worms are not highly regarded. We talk about a person "worming their way into someone's affection"; and calling anyone a worm is definitely not a compliment.

However earthworms are harmless, beneficial residents of the soil. They break down dead and decaying organic matter into rich humus soil, thereby supporting plant growth. They make holes that aerate soil and improve drainage, and of course feed birds. Time to give them their due!
